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CHAPTER 01 Who? What? Why?

# Church media ministry is designed to serve the entire church community. Its primary goals include:

- Communicating the Gospel: Using various media formats to spread the message of Jesus Christ to both members and non-believers.
- Enhancing Worship: Creating engaging and inspiring worship experiences through audio, visual, and digital elements.
- Building Community: Fostering a sense of connection and belonging among church members through online and offline media.
- Outreaching: Reaching new people and expanding the church's influence through digital platforms and community events.

 Providing Resources: Offering valuable resources, such as sermons, Bible studies, and other materials, to members and visitors.

In essence, church media ministry aims to leverage *technology* and *creativity* to support the spiritual growth and mission of the church.

CHAPTER

02 Audio



A church audio team, also known as an audio-visual (AV) team, is responsible for enhancing the worship experience by ensuring that the message is clearly communicated to the congregation. This includes:

- Setting up and maintaining the sound system:
   This may involve setting up and breaking down microphones, speakers, mixing boards, and other sound devices.
- Mixing sound, Troubleshooting technical issues, Collaborating with the worship team and pastor: This may include mixing sound for live events, recording services, and adjusting sound levels to accommodate solo performances and the sermon, this may include noting any broken equipment.
- Training and supervising volunteers: This may involve updating and maintaining role descriptions and checklists for audio processes.

An audio mixer, stage box, and amplifier are all used in audio systems for a variety of purposes, including live performances, recording, and broadcasting

 Audio mixer: PreSonus 32SC - Mixes multiple audio inputs to create a balanced output that's easy for the audience to hear. Mixers are used in many applications, including recording studios, public address systems, and television

### Power On

#### **POWER ON SEQUENCE**

When setting up audio equipment, you should generally power on the 1) MIXER 2) STAGEBOX before the 3) Amplifier to avoid potential loud pops or surges that could damage your speakers; essentially, turn on the sound source (mixer) first, then the power amplifier last

## **Power Off**

#### **POWER OFF SEQUENCE**

When powering down a sound system, you should always turn off the 1) Amplifier (power amp) first, then the 2) Mixer 3) Stagebox; essentially, turn off the power source last and the mixer first

CHAPTER

Video



#### Video is a powerful tool for church media ministry because it can:

- Engage the audience: Video can make everyone feel like they have a front-row seat, even if they're sitting far away.
- Expand the audience: Video technology can be used to record services and broadcast them online, which can attract new members and increase community engagement.
- Enhance the church's voice: Video production can help a church's unique voice be heard.
- Promote accessibility: Online content can make the church more accessible to people who are limited by illness, disability, or distance.
- Foster a sense of community: Online presence can help create a feeling of community and belonging, even when people aren't meeting in person.

- Reinforce branding: Video can help reinforce a church's branding.
- Spread the church's message: Video can help spread the church's message and mission.

The media ministry's goal is to use technology and media to carry the Gospel to the world and equip other ministries to use digital media as a tool for worship and outreach.

## Essential Video Equipment for a Small Church Media Ministry

- Camera: A camera can be a webcam, DSLR, camcorder, PTZ camera, or action camera.
- Computer: A modern computer or laptop with at least 8 GB of RAM and a 3.5Ghz Dual-Core Processor.
- **Video encoder**: A video encoder converts raw footage into a viewable format.
- Platform: A platform to go live on, such as a church website or social media channel.

Our live streaming setup are two (2) PTZ cameras connected to a computer, which can be relatively inexpensive and easy to set up. However, it has some limitations, such as only being able to stream from one angle.

# There are a number of reasons why a media ministry might want to upgrade their camera equipment, including:

- Equipment quality: The right equipment can make a significant difference in the quality of video production. For example, a camera and tripod combo with a pan arm can help with zoom and focus.
- Content style: Digital cinema cameras are designed to capture filmic images with a large sensor that allows for a shallow depth of field.
- **Engagement:** Video content can help increase engagement on social media platforms.

- Communication: Media technology can improve communication and involvement.
- Outreach: Media technology can help expand outreach to a broader audience.
- Real-time broadcasting: Media technology can enable churches to broadcast services in real-time during emergencies.

When deciding whether to upgrade, it can be helpful to focus on the results the upgrades will allow the ministry to achieve, rather than on features, brand names, or how cool it is.

Reasonable Expectations & Boundaries



## Key expectations for a church media ministry:

- Content quality: Creating visually appealing, engaging, and theologically sound content across various platforms like websites, social media, and live streams.
- Consistency: Regularly posting fresh content on a predictable schedule to maintain audience engagement.
- Alignment with church values: Ensuring all media reflects the church's mission, beliefs, and overall tone.
- Technical proficiency: Utilizing appropriate technology and staying updated on industry trends to produce professional-looking media.
- Collaboration: Working effectively with other church ministries to promote events, initiatives, and outreach efforts.

### Key expectations for a church media ministry:

- Accessibility: Making content accessible to a diverse audience through captions, transcripts, and alternative formats.
- Important boundaries for a church media ministry:
- Privacy protection: Respecting individuals'
   privacy by not sharing personal information
   without consent and adhering to data
   protection regulations.
- Content guidelines: Establishing clear guidelines regarding what is appropriate to post, including sensitive topics, personal opinions, and potentially controversial content.
- Time management: Maintaining a healthy work-life balance by setting limits on working hours and expectations for responsiveness.

### Key expectations for a church media ministry:

- Personal boundaries: Avoiding overly personal interactions with church members on social media or other platforms.
- Decision-making authority: Clearly defining who has the final say on content creation and approval processes.
- Conflict resolution: Having established procedures for addressing concerns or disagreements within the media team.

#### Four Essential Personal Boundaries For Church Leaders

**Time Boundaries:** These are often the most challenging for church leaders to enforce. We typically want to please people, don't want to let people down, chronically bite off more than we can chew and see it as part of our job description to be available at all times. So, what can we do? Here are some time boundary examples:

- Just say 'no' more often. I know this makes most of us feel uncomfortable, but remember time boundaries don't automatically mean you will never say yes. Instead, it's about deciding in advance what you will say yes and no to. Specifically, commit to say yes to those things that align with your passions, gifts, priorities and strengths and no to those things that deplete and exasperate you.
- **Requests**: If it isn't urgent, give yourself a generous time frame to take action.
- **Proposals**: Create <u>vetting criteria</u> to be completed by the person or team submitting a proposal for your consideration.
- Phone calls: Don't sleep near your phone. Turn on the silence mode when you don't want to be disturbed. Don't hesitate to let calls go to voice mail.
- **Email and texts**: Set aside specific times during the day to check emails. Set a reasonable goal to respond to personal emails, 24-48 hours.
- Make appointments with yourself: Block off time on your calendar for tasks and treat it as if it is an uninterruptable appointment, just as you would if you were meeting with someone.

# Reasonable Expectations & Boundavies

**Emotional Boundaries:** These boundaries are difficult because we nor others can always see when a line has been crossed. Emotional energy drain is inevitable. The trick is to save your emotional energy for the things in your life that really matter. Some emotional boundaries include:

- Watching or reading the news: If the nightly news or daily newspaper triggers depression or melancholy feelings then a necessary personal boundary might include deleting these from your daily routine.
- Browsing social media: If social media sends you into a spiral of frustration, sarcastic ravings and defensiveness, healthy boundaries may include deleting an app on your phone or unfriending someone.
- Certain movies: If war movies or contentious family dramas evoke uncomfortable memories then don't watch them and ask others to not watch them around you.
- Toxic conversations: If certain topics of conversations with a friend, family member or church member leave you anxious or angry you might ask them to avoid the topic around you.
- Email, blog and social media comments: If offensive personal attacks are reoccurring then having someone read and delete offensive comments can be a protective emotional boundary.
- Energy Vampires: Effective boundaries with energy vampires begin with keeping conversations short and factual with neutral emotions. If this isn't possible then consider setting a physical boundary to protect yourself emotionally.

# 06 Reasonable Expectations & Boundavies

**Physical Boundaries**: These types of boundaries relate to our physical space as well as our work and home environment. The key question to ask is how can I best protect my space and my environment? Some examples include:

- Greetings: You might need to tell someone you prefer to bump fists rather than shake hands, or shake hands instead of a hug.
- Spacing: If social distancing is important to you, let people know with a sign on your door. Same goes for masks.
- Limits on what people can bring into your home or office: This could range from no-smoking and noalcohol to no candy, soft drinks or unhealthy snacks.
- Decluttering: Make an intentional decision about what you will own and not own. For example, limit the number of books on your shelves or collectable items on display.
- Close the door: Let it be known that when your office door is closed you are not to be interrupted.
- Toxic people: Emotional, physical, psychological and sexual abusers have no place in your life, regardless of your job description or the position they hold. Boundaries that keeps these people at a physical distance is not selfish, it is a matter of self-preservation.

# 06 Reasonable Expectations & Boundavies

**Internal Boundaries**: An internal boundary helps you to accurately sort through your feelings and express them appropriately. Some internal boundaries include:

- Intense anger: Identifying the words, actions, people and situations that trigger intense anger and determining their root cause can become an internal boundary that helps you decide how or whether or not to express it.
- **Hurt and pain**: Old feelings of hurt can often attach themselves to current experiences, and emerge when we least expect them.
- Insults and criticism: When you receive criticism, are the brunt of someone's frustration, or when your spouse is angry at you an internal boundary talks you through what the other person said or did to you, and helps you sort out what's feedback that you should take seriously, and what you should disregard.
- Past experiences: An internal boundary can help you sense when you are going too far back or spending too much time in the past, and pulls you back to the moment at hand.
- Fear of the future: Spending too much time thinking about, imagining, worrying about or dreading the future can create anxiety and destroy our ability to live in and appreciate the moment. Strong internal boundaries can remind you that you are spending too much time in the future, and can help pull you back to the present.
- Burdens: Church leaders are often called to carry the burdens of their flock. At times it can become overwhelming. A helpful internal boundary is the mental image of a small basket that when full signals all of the burdens you plan to carry for the time being.



Spiritual Boundaries: Spiritual boundaries protect your right to believe what you want, worship as you wish, and practice your religious beliefs as you desire. For the spiritual leader these are boundaries that protect your soul, your inner and outer spiritual life. Surprisingly, church leaders may be the least prepared to build these types of boundaries as they have a false sense of security that their education and vocation protects them from spiritual malaise. Typical spiritual boundaries include:

- Protect your eyes: Computer and internet filters can be an effective spiritual boundary as they reduce the likelihood of seeing material that is soul threatening.
- Guard your schedule: Prioritizing a non-negotiable and uninterruptable time for your personal soul care and self-care and your family time is an essential spiritual boundary.
- Guarantee accountability: Surrounding yourself with people who will speak the unvarnished truth into your life and ask you the hard questions is a spiritual boundary that will protect you from yourself.
- Establish right relationships: Having people in your life who will encourage your spiritual growth is vital. Keeping people out of your life that discourage you spiritually is equally important.
- Determine wholesome experiences: Determining in advance those experiences and situations that encourage and deter your spiritual health is a boundary that protects as well as encourages your spiritual growth.



- Understand church branding: Align your media content with the church's overall brand identity to create a cohesive visual representation across platforms.

- Collaborate with the church leadership:
   Actively communicate with pastors, worship leaders, and other ministry heads to understand their vision and integrate media effectively into church programs.
- Stay updated on technology trends: Keep up with emerging media platforms, social media best practices, and new technologies to optimize your church's online presence.
- Build a volunteer team: Recruit and train individuals with different skill sets to build a strong media team capable of handling various tasks.

The link between ministry and technology is not immediately obvious. It can be easy to question whether technology has any place in the church at all. Still, as ministries around the country continue to incorporate various modes of technology into their day-to-day operations, it becomes paramount to examine God's Word on the subject.

#### Luke 8:1-11

Sowing seeds on as much soil as possible

This passage explains the parable of the sower. Sowers do not limit themselves to certain soils; instead, they spread seeds everywhere, including rocks, thorns, or other soils thought to be less fertile. For, though uncommon, sometimes these seeds are able to flourish into something beautiful.

As Christians, we are expected to do the same. We should not be selective in whom we extend ourselves to, but rather aim to spread Christ's message to as many people as possible. Technology lets us connect with a bigger audience than ever before.

#### Romans 10:14-15

How beautiful are the feet of those who carry good news

In Biblical times, the only way to "carry" good news was to bring it physically, walking from one place to another. Technological advances, however, have opened up numerous additional communication channels, all of which we can use to amplify the rate at which we spread the Word.

#### Matthew 28:16-20

Great Commission: Go make disciples of all nations

Jesus tells us to go out and make disciples of all nations – to spread the Word to people wherever they are. These days, people spend an increasing amount of time on their laptops, tablets and smart phones. Should we not use the technology available to us and meet them there? We are called to extend the message to people wherever they are, and technology allows us to do exactly that.

#### 1 Corinthians 12:21

The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!"

Every member of your congregation is blessed with a different set of skills and talents – embracing all of them is essential to building a strong community.

While you may excel in teaching or shepherding, others may find their strengths in technology. God bestowed each person with these gifts for a reason. Create an environment that encourages people to take advantage of their skillsets and use them in ways that glorify Him.
